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INTRODUCTION

It is hard to believe that P2P turned 21 this year, and that come February 2020 I will have been here for 20 of them. Thinking back over the people I have met and the things I have done makes me very glad that a chance meeting resulted in me hearing about, and ultimately, getting the job.

I have changed a lot since I started at P2P and, like me, the organisation is older and wiser. The need to follow funding sources has been responsible for a lot of the changes we made, however, the importance of our members and how we can best support them hasn't changed.

The NDIS has been the biggest change in disability in my time working in the industry and, indeed, in the history of the disability sector.

The NDIS has also influenced some of the biggest changes in P2P's history. Having the Sunshine Coast roll over to the NDIS so soon after Brisbane and the Gold Coast meant the numbers of our Plan Management and Coordination of Support work grew rapidly. We had anticipated a level of growth, however, nothing like the numbers we received.

We know that this bigger than anticipated growth caught us out and that we got behind. We also know that people were frustrated and that we didn't deliver the quality of service that we pride ourselves on. We are sorry for the impact that had and we thank the people that stayed with us while we worked hard (and on weekends) to get back under control.

Plan Management and Coordination of Supports is important as it provides us with a source of income. However, it is not our core work. We are still a grassroots organisation that listens to people and families, supports them on their journey and respects the individuality of all people with a disability.

This year we launched our "Let's Talk" series, starting with a focus on independent living. We plan to repeat this workshop in other locations in Queensland and look at other topics in the New Year.

We have some exciting plans around how we can get people talking and supporting each other again now that the preparation work for the NDIS is behind us. I hope you will all keep following us on Facebook and visiting our webpage to keep informed about these opportunities.

On behalf of the Board of Management I wish you all a safe and enjoyable Christmas and we look forward to working together again next year.

ABOUT US

Founded in 1998 by parents of people with a disability, P2P has evolved from a small support organisation to one that now harnesses local, national, and international networks to realise a more inclusive society for all.

All six members of the Board of Management and 85% of staff are either parents of someone, or have a person with disability in their family. P2P currently support over 600 Queenslanders with a disability and their families. Member engagement is integral to our work and our member driven approach informs our actions and values. This is evident by our ongoing relationship with Loud and Clear, a self-advocacy group that was established in 2015.

A member of Loud and Clear represents P2P on the Our Voice Committee. Our Voice is an official committee of Inclusion Australia. All members of Our Voice are people with intellectual disability nominated by their state agency members. P2P is the Queensland agency of Inclusion Australia.

We are independent providers of information and referrals through our role as Support Coordinators and provide financial guidance and support to achieve goals through our Plan Management services.

OUR MISSION AND VISION

In keeping with our mission to listen with respect to people who have a disability and their families and support them to achieve their goals, we launched a project to increase the number of accessible houses being built on the Sunshine Coast.

Our vision of creating opportunities within the community to empower people with disability and those who support them has seen us have another busy year.

Our vision of inspiring lifelong learning to increase knowledge, and strengthen the community to value the contribution of people who have a disability resulted in our first 'Let's Talk' workshop with a focus on independent living and what is needed to make it happen.

TREASURER'S REPORT

As Treasurer of Parent to Parent, I present to you my report and our Audited Financial Statements for the year to 30th June 2019.

As reported last year, the NDIS continues to bring considerable change to the sector and to our role in it. This year saw the wrapping up of Your Life Your Choice, which has been a significant part of our work for many years.

I am pleased to report that our Support and Information recurrent funding from the State Government has been extended until 30th June 2020.

The identification and implementation of new financial systems required to manage our time billing, payroll and finance in the NDIS environment processes that commenced last year is now mostly complete and working well. I thank Kiki, Ann, Steph and the other staff involved.

These changes have been critical in managing the very rapid and dramatic increase in demand for Plan Management services this year. An expansion of the finance team was required to meet this demand along with more office space to accommodate the extra

staff. In conjunction with this expansion, our telco systems for phone and internet were replaced as the old systems were not coping with the increased demand for services. Again I thank all the staff involved in achieving these major changes.

All of these improvements have been funded with savings carefully accrued over many years which have enabled us to transition successfully to working within the NDIS while continuing to provide high quality services to our customers and service users.

However, to ensure our sustainability into the future, we continue to explore options to generate an income that will fund our core work of planning, supporting and assisting people with a disability and their families.

Our financial records were audited by Mr. G Dunn of Greg Dunn and Associates and found to be in order. I would like to acknowledge and thank Ann for her work in preparing the documentation for audit and for her support in my role as Treasurer. I would also like to express my appreciation and gratitude to the whole finance team for their hard work and diligence throughout the year.

SUNSHINE COAST BUSINESS AWARDS

After winning last year's award, we were thrilled to be named as finalists again in recognition that we are on track as a not-for-profit led by its members with a focus on community inclusion for people with a disability.

In 2019 we continued to develop our independent support services through P2P Housing and worked in partnership with

fellow finalists Murphy Homes to launch "Project Silver".

Project Silver promotes liveability in housing design for new builds at minimal cost, adding ease of living, increased resale value and homes that adapt and change as you do.

This year's winner of our category was Coast2Bay Homes and we congratulate them for the recognition of the work they do.



P2P HOUSING

In response to messaging from our members that there is a real need for housing and building solutions, this year we introduced our new initiative, P2P Housing.

Not everyone has knowledge and expertise in home modifications, universal design and Specialist Disability Accommodation (SDA). Having an independent person to help you navigate through what you need to know is important.

Shane de Klerk, a qualified, licensed draftsman and an accredited Livable Housing Australia (LHA) assessor, heads up the P2P Housing team. With over 14 years building experience working with builders and architects he can be there with you throughout the process from design to completion. Shane's knowledge of drafting, design, and contract administration can take the worry out of your building experience.

Shane has already completed his first few LHA assessments and will be completing the LHA assessment for the new Daniel Morcombe Foundation project, Build it for the Kids.

If we had not, then we would have accepted the house from the Builder as is and would not have even seen the defects until we would have moved in our newly built house. Shane de Klerk who did our building inspection did his homework by going over the building contracts and variations before site visit. After the inspection a thorough report was prepared which I handed to Building Supervisor to rectify.

Because of so many items that needed attention I engaged P2P again to ensure all the items were completed. 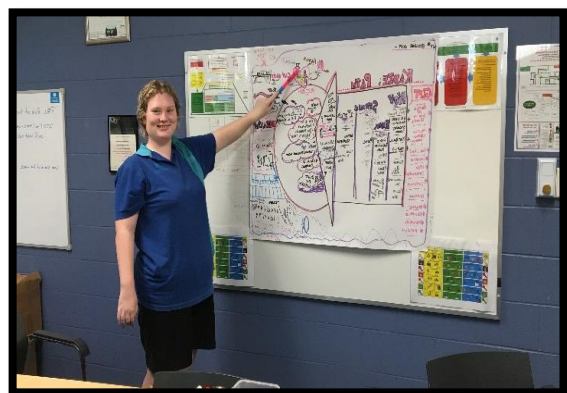

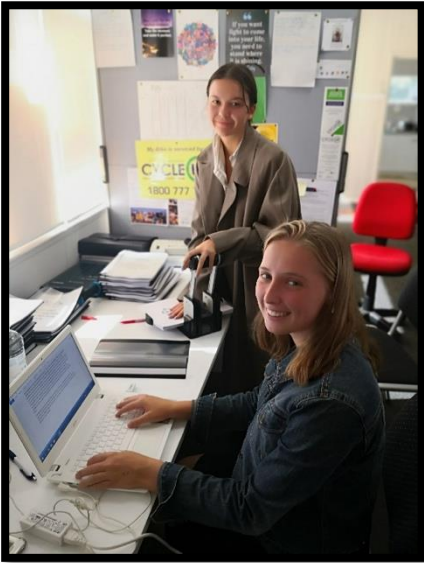

Planning Alternative Tomorrows with Hope (PATH) is a structured process which incorporates graphic images, colour and the use of words that represent meaning for a person on a journey (O’Brien, Pearpoint, Kahn, 2010).

Thomas is a 30-something resilient young man living with Autism. Thomas has utilised the PATH process to map a way forward to



achieving positive and possible goals, which in this instance was a move into his own home. Thomas, Arni and Matt shared Thomas’s PATH, together with explaining the steps of this person-centred planning process.

SUPPORT COORDINATION

This year the NDIS rolled out on the Sunshine Coast resulting in the team expanding from two to six. We welcomed Renae and Jo as Assistant Coordinators, and Ben and Laura as Support Coordinators. It took a while to recruit and retain staff initially but the team is now solidified and working well.

Early annual plan reviews – a recent challenge that coordinators faced, was the bringing forward of plan reviews for participants with little or no warning from the NDIA. All participants with plans due for review in January, and some in February, have had early reviews called by the NDIA. This has resulted in a greatly increased workload for support coordinators, including doing 12-month plan review documentation, attending the review meetings with participants (if requested) and then

implementing the new plans. We now are supporting approximately 160 participants across the Sunshine Coast region.

Positive Feedback - Coordinators have been complemented by NDIS planners regarding the quality and detailed content of the 'plan review documents' submitted at the time of the participant's plan review. P2P Coordinators have been praised by the NDIS planners for the timely submission of these reports and the usefulness of the information contained in these.

PLAN MANAGEMENT

This year our Your Life Your Choice work finished as Queensland transitioned fully to the NDIS. The way things were done under YLYC is very different to how things happen now and for many participants this resulted in frustration that they didn't anticipate or know to prepare for.

We moved from receiving funding in bulk that enabled invoices to be paid immediately, to a system that requires invoices to be loaded to the NDIS portal and then waiting for a response before scheduling the payment to the service provider or participant's bank account. This has meant we are no longer able to deliver the quick response we were known for.

In addition, the extra steps required added to our processing time and the large volume of

new participants meant that in the middle of this year the wait time for payment was longer than we wanted to be delivering. We apologise again for the inconvenience that this caused.

To improve our productivity and provide more timely information to the participant we have identified some additional options we would like for our software. Our software vendor has told us that it will be about a year before they can do this. In the meantime, we are working towards providing automatic monthly statements, however, until this is up and running, participants can request a statement at any time.

We have increased our Plan Management team with a focus on both bookkeeping skills and the lived experience of having a family member with a disability.
